Rice Challenge – Help Us Reach Our Target

Thank you to all those who have bought our rice to help towards our 90kg target. We still have rice to sell, white and brown varieties, so please stop and buy some. Together we can help a farmer in Malawi feed her family and pay for a year of secondary education for one child. That is a significant economic shift and changes her life from subsistence to stability and offers a range of employment opportunities.



The rice costs £4.00 per kilo and is available in the Welcome Hall before and after the service on Sundays. You can pay for the rice in two ways - cash or using the card scanner. If everyone bought a bag - just one bag - a child could be in secondary school by Christmas.
