Netherlee and Stamperland Forum

"Caroline Norton, a Scandalous Woman"

At the last forum meeting of 2023 Nan Steele, a former member of staff at Pollok House and now a dedicated volunteer, told us the rather tragic tale of the Honourable Caroline Norton. Born in London in 1808, she was the granddaughter of Irish playwright Richard Brinsley Sheridan. Caroline was a pretty and intelligent woman, however, as was the lot of a woman of her class finding a suitable husband was the key to future security.

At the age of nineteen, she was married to George Norton – a match most definitely not made in heaven! Neither he nor she had any money which caused tensions within the marriage and George was neither a patient nor kind man. He was increasingly jealous, possessive, and violent towards his wife, who under the laws at the time was now his possession and had few rights of her own. Her family helped George find employment and he became the Tory MP for Guildford and later a Metropolitan Police magistrate. While her marriage was deeply unhappy, she did find some happiness with the arrival of each of her three sons. She also wrote prolifically and made some money from the sale of these which her husband promptly confiscated.

Caroline was attractive, vivacious and enjoyed the company of men. She was a glittering socialite although her candid conversation and unorthodox behaviour did raise a few eyebrows. She was friends with the likes of Benjamin Disraeli and became a close friend of William Lamb, Lord Melbourne. In 1836 Caroline left her husband and George then abducted her sons, hiding them with relatives in Scotland and allowing her no access to them. He accused her of having an affair with Lord Melbourne and demanded £10,000 from the then prime minister. Melbourne refused and Norton took him to court for "criminal conversation" otherwise known as adultery. The case caused a furore in polite society and had the potential to bring down the government. In the end Melbourne won the case but despite this began to see less of Caroline. /...

Netherlee and Stamperland Forum (continued)

Separated from her children Caroline used her influence and writing skills to petition for a change in the law so that a mother would have a right to see her children if their parents separated. In 1839 parliament passed the Infant Custody Bill, allowing mothers to appeal for custody of children under seven and access to children under sixteen.

Caroline's life was marred by the tragedy of deaths of her children; William her youngest had a riding accident and died of lock jaw and Fletcher the eldest died whilst travelling abroad with the diplomatic corps. Caroline and Norton never divorced and were married for 45 years before Norton's death finally released her. Caroline had met and been friends with William Stirling Maxwell for many years and had stayed with him and his wife Anna Melville in their home at Keir House in Stirlingshire. She was fond of the Maxwell's sons John and Archibald, their presence making up in some small way for the loss of her own sons. Anna died in 1874 and Caroline and Sir William married in 1877. Caroline's happiness however was to be short lived as she died only three months after her marriage. Both she and William are buried in the crypt of Lecropt Church on the Keir estate. Despite the early hint at scandal, it was Caroline's persistence that changed the law which paved the way for improvements for mothers and children separated by a bad marriage.

PARTNERPLAN January Update

Today is day 101 following the Hamas attack on southern Israel and the overwhelming response by the Israeli state which is continuing. Tension is running high across the region and particularly in the north of Israel where there are daily encounters between the Israeli Defence Force and Hezbollah. Neither side seems to want all-out war, but when the stakes are high mistakes can happen with inevitable consequences. If there is no escalation in the north in the next week or so I plan to return to Tiberias at the beginning of February.

I have been based in Scotland since 14th October 2023 and have been speaking to different groups and churches in partner Presbyteries: Glasgow and Perth (and a brief foray to Edinburgh to cover for my colleague Rev Dr Stewart Gillan who returned to Jerusalem at the beginning of December.) I have also been leading worship online with the congregation of St Andrew's Jerusalem and Tiberias and keeping in touch with partners and friends as best I can. The overwhelming feeling from those I've spoken with here is a sense of helplessness. Night after night we watch horrific images on the news of destroyed buildings, of people picking through rubble by hand looking for survivors and listening to officials from the UN and World Health programmes and others talk about the scale of need and the impossibility of responding.

People in Israel are not seeing the same images. Their news feed is full of reminders of the atrocities experienced by Israelis at the hands of Hamas, reminders designed to stoke determination to continue the war. People in the occupied Palestinian territories get their news from other sources, an endless stream of misery reported on by Gazan journalists who have seen 82 Of their number killed since hostilities stepped up. Young people around the world get their news from Tik-Tok and Instagram and like the mainstream media view have to be very aware of bias and prejudice. The situation is polarized and it is hard to see a constructive way forward which addresses the fears and needs of both Palestinians and Israelis.

There are, however, some refreshing and encouraging voices. Rabbis for Human Rights, who have themselves been affected by October 7th have held on to their determination to behave with humanity, based on the Biblical injunctions to 'Love mercy, do justice and walk humbly with God'. Together for humanity have called for people to organise 'Building Bridges' vigils in their local area emphasising the humanity of all and the need to stand together against inhumanity. There will be a small silent vigil held in Maxwell Park, Kenmure Street in Glasgow on **Sunday 21**st **January at 5.00pm**. Participants are asked to bring a candle. What we can do seems so small in the face of fear, misery and unwillingness to dialogue. /...

But it seems to me that staying alert, keeping informed, holding our own government to account and standing in solidarity with others are all important ways to develop an alternative, collaborative view of a way forward. As we have said many times, the prayer from Christian Aid helps us enlarge our hearts and our thinking:

Pray not for Arab or Jew, for Palestinian or Israeli, but pray rather for ourselves, that we might not divide them in our prayers but keep them both together in our hearts.
